

# So Long, Farewell, Auf Weidersehen, Adieu....

fter eight years of writing an (almost) monthly newsletter column for the neighborhood associations of my House district, I am leaving office at the end of this year due to term limits. Thank you for the opportunity to serve you and for sharing your ideas with me in ways that made me a better House member. Please continue to stay in touch with your new state representative and other elected officials. Your voice matters!

I am very pleased that I was able to get legislation passed that came from my constituents. Thanks to the Clemons family, the lead poisoning clean-up process has been improved. Thanks to the Frick family, insurance companies who formerly exploited a loophole can no longer refuse to cover adopted children.

I was also able to increase discussion of Missouri's inadequate budget, our state's many unmet needs, and what we might do about it. Our state workers have the lowest pay in the entire country, and our teachers rank in the "fortysomethings" as well. Our lack of commitment to mental health funding hurts all of our communities as neighbors whose mental illnesses could be treated with community-based interventions drift into self-medicating behaviors, addictions, crime, and incarceration. May we see the folly of our ways and raise needed revenue through commonsense reforms that would make our

tax system more modern, adequate, and fair.

In the coming Legislative Session, I hope the Missouri House and Senate will recognize that the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that the Affordable Care Act (ACA) is constitutional and must be implemented in Missouri. In particular, we have the opportunity to expand Medicaid to cover 250,000 adults who have low incomes and are currently uninsured. We would receive an estimated \$8.4 billion from federal funds, and the state match would be about \$431 million, with no state contribution required until 2017. That's a \$19.50 match for every \$1 of state funding, while also greatly reducing the amount of uncompensated care in our state. Treatment for persons without insurance is a major factor in the spiraling cost of health insurance. Missouri businesses are placed at a disadvantage whenever our General Assembly refuses to act to reduce healthcare costs, especially at a time when other states are acting to reduce their own uninsured rolls through Medicaid expansion.

What's next for me? As of October 1, 2012, I became executive director of the Missouri Association for Social Welfare (MASW). MASW (www.masw.org), founded in 1901, provides leadership, research, education, and advocacy to improve public policy and programs impacting the health and welfare of all Missourians. MASW played major roles in the initiation

of the Missouri Commission on Human Rights, the reduction of sales tax on food by three cents, development of the Missouri Housing Trust Fund, and lawsuits leading to the creation of the Missouri Foundation for Health and provision of nonemergency transportation to Medicaid clients, plus many other social justice victories. Doesn't that sound like a good fit for a person of my passions and talents? If you care about MASW's issues, perhaps we'll find ways to continue working together.

The great thing about local businesses is that they care about US. They focus on the simple to fulfill our everyday needs. Who needs a choice of 15 items, when a line of 5 is sufficient? This means less inventory and lower overhead. Being more green and organic is now an option allowing us to live more sustainably. Speaking of sustainability, checkout how businesses help to sustain neighborhoods by supporting with sponsorships. Thumb through this issue to find the businesses who care about YOU!

## A Tool for Resolving Neighborhood Disputes

7 II residents of Benton Park Mest know of stories when next-door neighbors don't get along. District 3 Police Officers frequently respond to calls about illegal parking, barking dogs, trespassing on property and accusations of personal threats. Many of these situations could be resolved if the neighbors would agree to talk to each other about resolving their issues.

Mediation is one tool available to peacefully resolve neighborhood conflicts. The Community Mediation Program is a free service for residents. When a rerral is received the neighbors are contacted to explain the process of mediation and find a common time and place where they can meet. Two professionally trained volunteers serve as mediators who guide the conversation to enable the parties to reach a solution that works for them. The mediations typically don't last longer than two hours.

The majority of referrals currently come from your **Problem Property Officer** Krapf and Neighborhood Stabilization Officers Barb Potts and Dena Hibbard. They have received the complaints either through calls for police service or personal calls from neighbors. However, referrals are increasing directly from residents. The Community Mediation Program's telephone number is 314-533-3550 and the email address is mediateSTL@yahoo.com.

Community mediation is a program within the Mennonite Peace Center. An open house is scheduled for individuals who might be interested in becoming neighborhood mediators: December 8<sup>th</sup>, Saturday, 9:30 -1:30 at the St Louis Mennonite Fellowship on the corner of Chippewa and Giles. # Tips for Fraud-Free Holiday Shopping

Between the in-store sales and the online deals, it's almost impossible to resist shopping this time of year. From Black Friday to Cyber Monday, there are plenty of opportunities to buy just what you're looking for. But watch out- some unscrupulous scammers use the busy holiday season to take advantage of unsuspecting shoppers.

The National Retail Federation projects that online sales will reach \$96 billion. Whether you decide to shop online or in stores, there are several things you should be aware of to help save you time and money. Here are some things to keep in mind:

If the deal seems too good to be true, it probably is. Everyone wants to get their hands on the hottest toy or latest tablet. Scammers know this, and use the hot new items to trick people. When buying things online, make sure that the seller is reputable. Check the Better Business Bureau to ensure that it's a legitimate company. Many times, if you get scammed online, there's no way to get your money back.

When buying online, use a credit card. If you're shopping online, using a credit card usually affords you more protection than a debit

card. If fraud does occur, your money won't be tied up while you wait for it to get resolved.

If you're out shopping, don't make yourself a target. Park your car in a well-lit parking lot and keep all your valuables out of sight in the trunk. When walking around, don't carry shopping bags full of items. Criminals target people who are distracted or who look like an easy target. Be alert to your surroundings.

When using your card in a public place or ATM, watch for skimmers. A "skimming" device is something scammers use to collect your debit or credit card information. They are attached to a legitimate machine, like an ATM, and are sometimes difficult to detect. Keep an eye out for anything on the device that looks out of place.

Make sure your computer is ready for the holiday shopping season. Update your spyware and antivirus programs. Be wary of any emails offering you free items, such as gift cards, and always make sure it's a legitimate sender before opening any attachments. By keeping your computer free of spyware and viruses, ou're protecting your financial and personal information.


